## Sandyford Urban Framework Plan Adopted by Councillors

# *"Opens the Door for Sandyford Renewal"*

One of the most positive recent developments for the Sandyford Business District was the adoption of the Sandyford Urban Framework Plan (SUFP) which had been in proposal stage for some time.

Effectively, it is the agreement of a strategy for the means by which the Sandyford Business District can continue to grow and develop as the major business hub of South County Dublin, in a planned and concerted way.


Commenting on the Council decision, Jim Leyden, Chairman, SBDA said "The Sandyford Business District is a hugely attractive location for business to operate from. The infrastructure, development quality and accessibility of the area is unrivalled, and the ratification of this plan sets out how future progress can be made to further enhance Sandyford as a primary business destination. It also further supports the development of the Southern Economic Corridor, of which Sandyford is such an integral part."

"All businesses in the area welcome this development, as it sends out such a clear and unequivocal message that Sandyford is very definitely "Open for Business", and that we are all looking confidently to the future.

Although the ratification process took longer than any of us anticipated, now that it has finally happened, it clearly endorses Sandyford as a great location with a proven track record of attracting and maintain multinationals and small business alike. Planned mixed developments like Sandyford, with Corporate, Business, Office, Professional, Retail, Residential and a co-ordinated Access and Mobility Infrastructure, are where the future lies. Sandyford is ahead of

the game, and the ratification of the SUFP ensures that it's going to stay there"







## SBDA Calls for Realistic 5% Reduction in Commercial Rates

#### "Ratepayers Cannot Continue to be the Fall Guy"

On behalf of its members, SBDA is once again urging both the executive and councillors of Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council to return commercial rates to the levels expected and budgeted for after the revaluation process last year. This follows last year's shock increase of 3% above the estimated Local Authority Multiplier (ARV).

In addition to this, SBDA is lobbying for a further reduction of 2% to reflect the commercial reality within which business are currently operating.

"Everyone is squeezed very badly at the moment", commented a SBDA spokesperson, "All of us in business are having to review our cost base and cut our cloth accordingly. The local authority should be no different."

"We all appreciate that the Council has services which they must fund, but instead of addressing the reasons for increased costs in those areas, their solution always seems to be to make the business community pay more. That is neither realistic nor sustainable in the current economic climate."

Businesses already feeling the pressure, were further burdened by an unexpected rates increase last year, which was a full 3% higher than what had been estimated after the Revaluation was completed in Dun Laoghaire Rathdown. With the level of rates bills fast catching up on rent levels, an increase of such magnitude threatens the viability of many businesses.

"We all know that growth and jobs are the key to turning our economy around," a SBDA spokesperson concluded, "Increasing rates to unsustainable levels is anti-growth and anti-jobs; in the end it's also short sighted and counterproductive, as businesses will inevitably fold under the pressure, taking them out of the rates net altogether."

"The Council must be proactive on this vital issue, and reduce future rates bills to realistic and sustainable levels. Our future is also the Council's future".

## **Sandyford Smarter Travel**



The Sandyford Business District is a key economic zone in the Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council area and greater Dublin. In this regard, the efficient movement of people to and from the entire area is a priority for everyone.

Sandyford Business District includes the following separate business estates and sites - Stillorgan Industrial Park, Sandyford Business Park, Central Park, South County Business Park, the Legionaries of Christ and Leopardstown Park Hospital.

Significant additional development is planned for the Sandyford Business District in the coming years - as outlined in the recently adopted Sandyford Urban Framework Plan. Over the longer term, this will result in an increase in traffic which will further impact on the high level of congestion on some roads approaching the area, particularly during commuting hours.

Over the coming weeks, Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council, with the support of SBDA, will be engaging with companies in the Sandyford Business District to promote the concept of workplace 'Mobility Management Planning'. The project aims to provide for the transport needs of those living and working in the area through an overall package of measures aimed at achieving lasting behaviour change, reducing travel demand and the provision of new infrastructure.

For some, commuting by car in and out of the Sandyford area

may be a necessity because they don't have immediately accessible or reliable alternatives. For others, there are choices from a range of travel options.

The vision for the Sandyford Smarter Travel project is to develop a sustainable urban community with a strong sense of identity, providing better quality of life to the people who live and work and in the area. It is also aimed at ensuring that development occurs at a pace where it is supported by sustainable transport choices.

It will focus on improving everyone's journey to and from work and will provide a platform to address transportation issues in the area.

Smarter Travel isn't something that happens to people. It's something that everyone does collectively for themselves, helped by transport initiatives and area wide planning.

At a consumer level, the initiative will ask people to leave the car at home for at least some journeys every week. That could be as simple as walking or cycling whenever you can, choosing to take the BUS, LUAS or DART to work a couple of times a week, or carsharing with colleagues to and from work. Workplaces will be asked to support these messages among their staff and colleagues.

Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council in association with SBDA are launching the Area Wide Mobility Management Plan for Sandyford Business District in Bewleys Hotel on the 6th December at 12.30. More information can be found on **www.sandyfordsmartertravel.ie**.

The Sandyford Smarter Travel project aims to improve and promote sustainable travel options for those working in the area. This will happen over time mainly through Mobility Management Planning, and the upgrade of infrastructure. These are both key objectives in the recently adopted Sandyford Urban Framework Plan.

How people travel costs them and their organisations time and money. Apart from roads infrastructure, the issue of 'Mobility Management' is very important in terms of accessibility for staff, clients, customers and

business partners as well as goods inwards and outwards. Mobility Management Plans also help businesses and employees to make a difference in terms of quality of life, health of employees and the environment.

Ultimately, the intention for the new year will be to establish a Mobility Management Planning Network between Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council and companies in the Sandyford Business District to support workplace Mobility Management Planning.

The initiative forms a key element of the Sandyford Urban Framework Plan designed to promote business in the area. Overall, it will be of benefit for everyone and for businesses.

## **New Road Planned for Sandyford**


At a recent meeting with the SBDA committee, Therese Langan and John Bowes of DLRCOCo unveiled plans for the extension of the Burtonhall Road from its junction with Blackthorn Avenue to its junction with Leopardstown Road.

The development of this new link road is part of the overall SUFP, which identified key road improvements required to accommodate the expected growth in the Sandyford Business District on its southern side.

The aim of the road, which it is estimated will carry 10,000 cars a day, is to ease congestion and facilitate better access to and from the Sandyford Business District.

When completed, the 0.21km of new road will include a Quality Bus Corridor (QBC), cycle lanes, and footpaths. The development is currently in its consultation phase, and submission/observations are being accepted by DLRCoCo until 09th December.

A SBDA spokesperson said, "This is further indication of the Council's commitment to the Sandyford Business District, and we welcome it. Ease of access is a big issue for all businesses in the area, and we look forward to seeing this plan expedited with all possible speed."

## Leopardstown Roundabout

Traffic flow, both vehicular and pedestrian, has long been a vexed question at Leopardstown Roundabout. However, with numbers of cyclists and pedestrians growing every year, the safety issues had become increasingly acute.

So SBDA has been pleased to welcome the signalled pedestrian crossing points which have been installed on the Leopardstown Road and Brewery Road approaches to the roundabout. This has allowed pedestrians and cyclists safe passage across these busy junctions.

However, SBDA is also aware that the changes have brought some added time delays for commuters in cars, and this situation must be urgently addressed.

It is clear that the only viable long-term solution to the congestion at the roundabout is to make it fully signalled. DLRCOCo has been clear from the outset that fully signalising the roundabout is their ultimate objective. However the project is part of the wider road improvement scheme as identified by the SUFP, and will be dealt with in tandem with the Burtonhall Road extension scheme, which is now in the early stages of development. SBDA welcomes the ongoing planning process, and urges a speedy resolution to the issue.



## **Change of Direction**

As part of the overall plan to improve access to and from, and traffic flow within Sandyford Business District, DLRCOCo intend to make some changes to the one way system.

Currently, if entering the District from Kilmacud, with a destination on Blackthorn Road or beyond, it is necessary to "do a loop" around Blackthorn Avenue, which runs along at the Luas terminus; around onto Burton Hall Avenue, by Bizquip, and up to the junction at Blackthorn Road (Avid & Microsoft), with the option to go left or right there.

Under the new plan, when entering Sandyford Business District from the Kilmacud Road, crossing over the Luas line and turning left towards Leopardstown, it will be possible to take the next turn right at AIB and go up Blackthorn Road towards Microsoft. Blackthorn Road will thus become a TWO way road, benefiting commuters at all times of the day.

New traffic lights are to be installed too, and it is hoped that this proposal will draw unnecessary traffic away from the Leopardstown roundabout direction, thus improving traffic flow and reducing travel times within the district.

This new plan is due to be put into action in early 2012. So obviously we will all need to pay extra attention until we are used to the new arrangement!

#### Murphystown Way – a Welcome Addition

Again with free flow and accessibility as a priority, the opening of Murphystown Way has proved a great success. Traffic wishing to connect to the Carrrickmines junction, heading south, are seeing a reduction in their journey time and a much improved routing system.

## Lights On

The recent activation of the traffic lights at what is locally referred to as the "ESB roundabout" is another helpful contribution to traffic flow around the Sandyford Business District. The lights will hopefully alleviate some of the backlog which was such a nuisance to commuters trying to access the District off the M50 in the mornings. It's all in the sequencing – so let's hope that's properly synchronised! SBDA are carefully monitoring and continuing to liase with the Council regarding the smooth operation of this junction.

### New Route For Pedestrians & Cyclists

For those of you entering Sandyford Business District from Leopardstown Road, on foot or on your bike, it is planned that a new car-free route will soon be available to you.

Following the footprint of what was once known as the Harcourt Street Line, this pedestrian/cycle route will link Leopardstown Road to Brewery Road. The entrance on Leopardstown Road will be close to the parade of shops, and it will exit on Brewery Road opposite the pedestrian entrance to the LUAS terminus.

This pleasant route, which will be fully lit, will offer a much quicker and safer alternative to walkers and cyclists entering the District. In addition, it will also serve as an additional amenity for local residents. It is expected that the "Green Route", as it will be known, will be open for use by mid 2012.

#### Watch out for Leaks & Burst Pipes this Winter!



As all businesses are now having their water consumption metred by the Council, it's important to ensure that there are no leaks in your system. A quick way to check is by taking a meter reading on Friday evening when the business closes, and check it again first thing on Monday morning before opening again. If the premises have been empty all weekend, the reading should be the same. If it has changed – you need to start looking for a leak, which is costing you money.

We all hope that we won't return to the blizzard conditions of last year, but some cold weather is inevitable. It's really important for businesses to remember that pipes freeze and burst easily, especially if heat is turned off completely. A small investment in keeping the heat on at a reduced temperature overnight and at the weekend could, save you all the inconvenience and costs of clearing up after a burst pipe. # Stay Safe

As the dark winter evenings have closed in, it is very important that extra thought and vigilance is applied to personal safety. By bearing in mind a few simple guidelines, it is possible to avoid any potential hazards posed by the darkness.

When walking anywhere, it's advisable to always follow these simple guidelines:

Do not text while walking – if your attention is focussed on your phone, you may not be able to act quickly enough should something happen

Avoid — if you are made to feel uncomfortable by a person or group of people in your path, cross the road or turn around. Your safety is more important than appearing unfriendly

Let it go — Phones, handbags and possessions can be replaced, but your health and safety cannot

Be aware – have a good look around you as you are walking to your destination and assess how safe your path is. If it is dark, or you feel uncomfortable in any way, try to get someone else to accompany you.

If you feel threatened or unsafe at any time, use your phone to call 999. However, it is also useful to have the number of the local Garda station in Stepaside saved on your phone. By dialling directly through to them in situations which do not constitute a total emergency, they are often well placed to send assistance to the area very quickly.

#### What to report to the Emergency call-taker

Remember the critical information needed from you by the Emergency call-taker to ensure they can get a patrol car out to you as soon as possible is:

- 1. Your exact location
- 2. Your phone number
- 3. Your name
- 4. Details of the incident (i.e. why you are calling)

The job of the Emergency call-taker is to take the details of your call in order to be able to send a patrol car to you. The Emergency call-taker may look for other information from you in order to be able to give the patrol car as much information as possible. Where possible, the call-taker will stay on the line with you until a patrol car arrives to where you are.


